The project engaged young people who were not in education, employment or training. The young people worked with experienced artists across a range of art forms, developing key skills, teamwork and confidence through group projects. They produced high quality art that was seen in a public exhibition and publicly sited instillations.




ichair- first steps - getting to know each other - assembling basic the chair - research and design.

Concrete Sheep

Phase two of the Momentum project was to work with young people aged 18-24 on a 6 week initiative that would result in two separate publicly sited art instillations. The young people who had no previous art experience and very little practical knowledge were taken step by step through the complex processes and came out of the course with Agored Cymru accreditations, CSCS cards and they also received careers advice and were signposted to educational, training and employment opportunities. The concrete sheep process:

- 1. Researching the sheep from an identified breed and gathering measurements
- 2. Sketching ideas and making small models
- 3. Assembling the workshop and having tool box talks on health and safety
- 4. Building the armature of the sheep from wood and chicken wire
- 5. Covering the armature with clay and sculpting it
- 6. Finalising the finished clay model and leaving it to harden
- 7. Covering the model in cardboard flanges for the latex mould
- 8. Layering on twenty plus coats of liquid latex over a few days
- 9. Adding more cardboard flanges for the mother case
- 10. Rolling on fibreglass matting to make the mother case
- 11. Adding support struts and defining the flanges plus drilling holes for bolts
- 12. Cutting up rebar rods and adding chicken wire and cement to form legs
- 13. Removing the mother case and latex mould and cleaning out all the clay
- 14. Preparing the moulds with supports for the legs and inserting former shapes
- 15. Mixing cement and pouring into the mould and vibrating the case to release air
- 16. Removing outer case and latex mould to reveal concrete sheep
- 17. Grinding all excess edges and repairing any air pockets
- 18. Transporting to site and preparing the ground with trenches
- 19. Sinking the legs into the trenches and adding cement then covering with soil
- 20. Painting with primer coat and then painting the finished design

Adding cardboard flanges - layering on fibreglass matting.



Removing the mother case and latex mould and then trimming - cleaning - bolting back together and adding release agent.



Inserting formers - legs - mixing cement and pouring.



Removing the mother case - latex mould - revealing the raw concrete sheep.



On site working out layout - digging trenches - cementing the foundations and restoring the turf.



Priming the sheep and then using dry brushing techniques painting them to a finished effect.



The flock out side the community Hub were painted as jungle animals.



The flock situated inside the St Fagan's open air museum - sharing a field with the original models.
